Dear Director of Undergraduate Admissions

My name is XXXXXXXXXX and I am a high school senior attending XXXXXX High School in Rocky River, Ohio. I feel honored and thrilled to have recently been admitted to XXXXXX, as it is my number one choice. However, I'm concerned about my ability to finance my college education at your school, so I am respectfully asking for an adjustment of my financial aid award.

To be clear, I would love to attend XXXXXXX. Your Intelligence Studies program is the reason for my desire to attend your school. Everyone I have spoken to in the intelligence field tells me about the quality of your program and the strength of your graduates. They have indicated that your program will teach me the analytic and critical thinking skills needed for success in this field in both a classroom setting and through real world opportunities. That is very appealing to me.

However, I am finding it difficult to accept my admission because:

- 1. I received a better financial aid offer from XXXXXXXX
- 2. My Dads business was negatively impacted by the Covid shutdowns and it is unclear if 2021 will be any better given that his business is sports and tournament related.

To be specific on the financial aid offer, here's my XXXX offer, compared to the one from XXXXXX:

- XXXXX: Tuition and Fees (\$5,803), Room and Board (\$5,488) which comes to \$11,291 a semester. They are also offering merit aid of \$1,000 to \$2000 per semester in Academic Scholarship (the amount to be determined in February) plus an Academic Housing scholarship of \$1,471 per semester. This aid therefore totals a minimum of \$2,471 per semester. This means my cost to attend XXXXXXX will be \$8,820 per semester or approximately \$17,640 a year. In addition, XXXXXXXX has a policy that costs remain constant for the first 4 years of attendance.
- **XXXXXX:** Tuition and Fees (\$42,075), Room and Board (\$15,000) which come to \$57,075. You have offered me \$24,000 which makes my cost to attend \$33,075 the first year with possible further increases each year.

As you can see, XXXXXX is asking me to pay approximately \$15,435 more per year. So while XXXXX is by far my first choice it is hard to financially justify enrolling at XXXXX given my family's financial situation and the XXXXXXX offer.

In addition, my Dad runs a lacrosse club in Northern Ohio. In 2020, the Covid shutdowns, stay at home orders and restrictions on gatherings had a negative impact on my Dad's business. In the second quarter (April to June) revenue in our business dropped over 90% as the shutdowns, stay at home orders and restrictions on gatherings kept people from being able to attend practice and tournaments. We did see an increase in business as the summer progressed however, the business had a second negative quarter in the October / December quarter as Covid concerns increased and governments responded with another round of shutdowns, school closings and restrictions on gatherings. We are hopeful that things rebound in 2021 and the business bounces back but we have to be cautious about expenditures while we wait to see what happens in 2021.

I appreciate your help and time in reviewing these circumstances and thank you in advance for considering an adjustment to my financial aid award package.

Thank you in advance for taking a few minutes to read this note.

Despite everything going on with Covid he arranged for us to meet with himself, several members of your department and allowed me to sit in on a class.
